INTRODUCTION

The information included in this report card is intended to be of interest to parents and the community so that they can make informed choices about schools. It is designed to provide an insight into the school's culture, values and emphasis and give an indication of how the school is performing in academic and extra curricula activities. Gulf Christian College has a strong association with Nambour Christian College which is located on the Sunshine Coast in Queensland.

LOCATION & DETAILS

Gulf Christian College is a co-educational school located in the Gulf Country region of northern Queensland, Australia, just south of the Gulf of Carpentaria, on the Norman River.

CHARACTERISTICS OF STUDENT BODY

The College has continued to focus on ensuring that there is a majority Indigenous student cohort within its community, to align with our Constitutional objectives. Enrolment trends in the College have maintained positive stability, with some fluctuations, with 100 enrolments noted in our Commonwealth Census in 2022.

RELIGION & AFFILIATIONS

Gulf Christian College is an independent inter-denominational Christian school. The College holds memberships with Associated Christian Schools (ACS) and Independent Schools Queensland (ISQ).

DISTINCTIVE CURRICULUM OFFERINGS

Gulf Christian College has continued to advance its mission to be recognized as a Christian College where opportunities are created for students through quality education, founded on Christian values and cultural heritage in partnership with staff, parents and the community.

Gulf Christian College provides a balanced curriculum based on the current Australian curriculum subjects. The curriculum is developed around multi-media learning. Students in Prep to Year 9 participate in English, Mathematics, Science and History studies as core subjects. They are also taught Physical Education, The Arts, Information Technology and Media. The Indigenous Language Program commenced in 2020, being taught from Prep to Year 2.

Middle School students in Years 7 to 9 are provided with opportunities to participate in rotational subjects, including Manual Arts and Food Technology and Design. Students in Year 7 to 9 also are provided the opportunity to participate in a boarding preparation and transition program called 'Beyond Horizons', which includes travel to and lesson integration in a large school community for 2 weeks each year. Unique to our College is the opportunity for students to participate in cultural studies from local Indigenous people.



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EXTRA-CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

We continue to develop extra-curricular activities. Listed below are current programs.

MIDDLE SCHOOL PROGRAM

Years 7, 8 and 9 travelled to Peace Lutheran College in Cairns as a part of the Beyond Horizons Program. Each program runs for two weeks, with 2 trips per year offered to Middle School students. The purpose of the program is for students to join the curriculum program and extra-curricular boarding program provided there. This offers them a boarding experience in preparation for their future senior schooling options.

As well as being part of a large College, this also provides them with involvement in a broader community, enabling them to participate in excursions, outdoor education and other weekend activities in the Cairns region.

COMMUNITY PROGRAMS

The Gulf Christian College is committed to being involved in the Community. The College participates in many local community events, including:

The College is committed to being involved in any and all community events where possible. This has resulted in the positive reputation of the College within the community.

CHAPEL

Weekly chapel services continued to be presented in a more open format to enable physical distancing. These were held in the open forecourt of the College, with parents, family



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members and local community groups attending. Classes are given the opportunity to lead the chapel service once each term.

LEARNING ENRICHMENT

As part of the Learning Enrichment Program within the College, there are a number of initiatives provided to enhance the learning of our students.

- Assessments from external consultants seek to evaluate the learning difficulties of students to provide opportunities to encourage understanding.
- PAT testing to focus on Mathematics
- Development of a tracking and recording mechanism for students who are not verified as having an impairment but display other learning and social needs

NAIDOC WEEK

The theme of NAIDOC week this year was “Get Up! Stand Up! Show Up!”. Held to increase the awareness and significance of the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples, students participated in cultural and art activities. Celebrations and activities were held at the College during July 2022.

SPORT

Opportunities are provided for the Gulf Christian College students to participate in a variety of sports throughout the school year. These sports included NRL, Athletics, Cross country, Swimming, Hockey, Touch Football, Auskick, Rugby, Basketball and other sports when available.

All Primary students participated in swimming lessons during Term 4 which finished in the culmination of the Swimming Carnival on Thursday 17 November.

Teams Andy (Gold) and Sorohan (Green) competed in the Interhouse Athletics Carnival, Cross-Country, and Swimming carnival during 2022.

The GCC Mountain Bike Club commenced, with a high level of participation from both Primary and Middle School students.

The Karumba Festival of Sport (Basketball and Hockey) allowed students to participate in both junior and senior teams and they achieved well.

A Regional sporting program was continued, with participation in the North West Region. A College student was successful at the Regional Athletics and attended State Championships in Brisbane.



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PARTNERSHIPS WITH COMMUNITY ORGANISATIONS

Bynoe Community Advancement Cooperative Society operates the Kickstart Program at the Fred Edwards Sports Centre. This program provides breakfast, as well as physical activity for students before they start the school day. This is open to all children of school age who live in Normanton, and helps to build relationships and community, while meeting the physical needs of these students.

The College seeks to develop ideas and cultural programs for Middle School students with Indigenous elders and Rangers at Delta Downs.

Other organisations we partnerships with include Local Advisory Group on language teaching, Carpentaria Shire Council, Normanton Christian Fellowship, Deadly Choices Team, Carpentaria Land and Sea Rangers, Normanton Stingers Rugby League Club, North & West Remote Health, Gidgee Healing Team, Gulf Schools Management Group, James Cook University OT Department/students, and Calvary Christian College (Townsville).

SOCIAL CLIMATE OF OUR SCHOOL

The College has policies for the protection and welfare of students including Child Protection and Bullying Policies. Engagement with local organisations, Family and Community Engagement Team, Save the Children, North and West Remote Health, Centrecare and Normanton Police continue to engage the community in the life of the College. A Breakfast Program is offered by the College to ensure students have the energy to maintain their focus on school activities throughout the day.

Personal Development workshops are organised for Middle School students including specialist input from Allied Health services.

The pastoral care program is refined through the implementation of personal development groups and the engagement of a school Student Wellbeing Officer.

The College provides directed training and support to staff in a program called Real Schools "Building a Restorative School Community" where staff, students and families work in partnership to provide a holistic approach for our students in all aspects of their schooling journey.

The Aboriginal Insights Program (an Aboriginal Awareness Program) was implemented for all staff to provide education around how to support the unique cultural environment in



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Normanton, being a predominantly Indigenous community.

PARENTAL INVOLVEMENT

Opportunities exist for parents to become involved at Gulf Christian College. When possible, a number of parents attended the cultural days throughout the year, and many attend the weekly Chapel services as well as other events that are part of the College program. We have a new group that has started meeting during Semester 2, the GCC C.A.F.E. meeting (Cultural Advisory and Family Engagement)

PARENT, TEACHER AND STUDENT SATISFACTION

Regular opportunities are provided to the parents and staff to meet with the Principal and Management representatives of Gulf Christian College.

From time-to-time parents are contacted to assist with upcoming events and these opportunities are used to gauge parent satisfaction with the College.

MANAGEMENT OF NON-ATTENDANCE

The issue of non-attendance is managed in a number of ways. Firstly, the College operates a bus which collects students in the morning. When class commences the rolls are marked and those not present are followed up by the Cultural Support Officer using various means. An attempt is made to locate the student to ascertain the reason for non-attendance, or visits are made to the family home to discuss with parents the possibilities to assist future attendance.

Student attendance is important in providing new knowledge, learning and socialization for our students, and is therefore seen as imperative to positive student outcomes. FaCE (Family and Community Engagement) provides support to the family and students of the College who may find school attendance difficult. It has been developed by the Australian Government as part of the parental engagement project to strengthen family and community engagement in student learning and the life of the school.



NAPLAN RESULTS FOR YEARS 3, 5, 7 & 9 IN 2022

NAPLAN testing was conducted online at the College for the first time this year and progressed well. Students were supported throughout this process and achieved well, considering the changes that were made. The 5 curriculum areas within NAPLAN testing include Reading, Writing, Spelling, Grammar & Punctuation and Numeracy. Some students are exempt for certain areas of the testing requirements.
